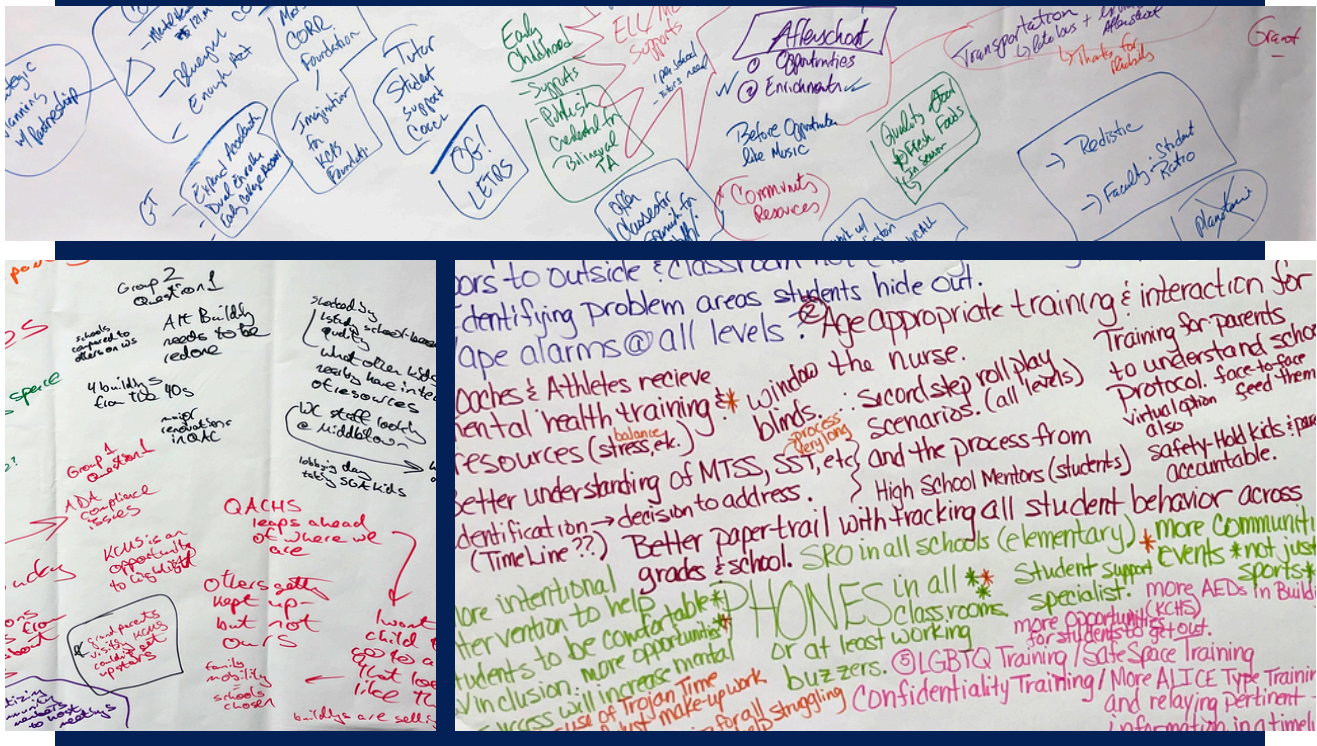

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

When she joined Kent County Public Schools on July 1, 2025, Dr. Mary Boswell-McComas was set to take on a daunting challenge as the new superintendent.

She jumped right in, with a focus on preparing a new five-year strategic plan for the school system. To put her plan together, she first needed to learn about the community and what it wants for its schools system.

Throughout the summer and fall, Dr. McComas met with Kent County Public Schools' teachers, staff and administrators; visited local business leaders, met with government officials; and introduced herself to as many people as possible.

Dr. McComas also sought to formalize many of her discussions with a series of public forums. The five Community Conversations were held at each school throughout October and November.

The sessions utilized the World Café model. Participants sat in groups at tables with a facilitator and shared their thoughts on a particular topic affecting Kent County Public Schools.

The groups were randomly seated. When it was time to rotate tables, participants were encouraged to join a different group of people.

The topics discussed were: Academics and Workforce Training, Our Annual Bud-get, Community Engagement, Supporting Student Success and Facilities and Equipment.

Each time a new group was seated at a table, they received a different question than the previous group. This ensured that conversations ran deeper than lists of wishes and complaints, to include more vision- and solution-based discussions.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Public Participation

Community Conversations were held at each of our five schools between October and November. These were advertised through press releases, flyers, direct family contact, social media and other outlets. The Citizen Advisory Committee participated in a session during one of its meetings. A session was held for all staff members as part of a Professional Development Day at Kent County High School. We also opened an online survey to capture additional comments from those who attended sessions and wanted to keep the conversation going.



Current Academic Goals in the 2020–25 Strategic Plan

- ★ Kent County Public Schools will support Early Learning to provide a strong foundation for future academic excellence and success.
- ★ Our students will have equitable access to rigorous culturally relevant curriculum and instruction aligned to Maryland College and Career Readiness standards.

Did you know ...

KCPS was an early adopter of all-day universal pre-K, years before it was required under the Blueprint for Maryland's Future?

Training

Many days off for students are still work days for teachers and staff. We provide Professional Development throughout the year so teachers can grow the skills they need to be successful in the classroom.

Science of Reading

The Science of Reading aligns instruction to what we know about how the brain learns to read. We are using the Orton-Gillingham method (OG Time) to focus early reading instruction, in part, on the phonics that make up the structure of words.

Something to think about ...

We are committed to data collection and using state and our own local assessment scores to maximize the educational impact for each student.

STAKEHOLDER SENTIMENTS

LEADING DISCUSSION TOPICS

- Homework: need more, including summer reading, book reports and routine writing; concern about too much homework for math; parents need help with math including a Math Night
- Bilingual Resources: support for multilingual learners (ML), full-time ML staff members, English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) programs for students and adults, Spanish for teachers, supports that fit with our curriculum
- Communication among educators: vertical articulation and alignment across grades; grade-to-grade communication, transition and student tracking; systems to catch struggling students
- Teaching legacy subjects: cursive
- Media and information literacy: fact from fiction on the internet and social media
- Meeting needs of accelerated students: Gifted and Talented programming; teaching more higher math; earlier opportunities for MakerSpace and Stem programs
- Maintain and support Orton-Gillingham training for teachers
- Hands-on learning
- Class sizes
- Succession planning

QUESTIONS TO ANSWER

- How reliant are we on Chromebooks? Are we using them effectively? Are we mindful of the amount of time students are using on them?
- What does AI mean for schools?

NEW AND INTERESTING IDEAS

- Introducing foreign languages in elementary school
- Career and Technical Education (CTE) and College Prep transition programs beginning in the middle school
- Build more student, family and community engagement through clubs, science fairs, family projects, spelling and geography bees, elementary school performing arts, etc.
- Financial education: literacy, budgeting and taxes, economics, etc.
- Summer professional development instead of during the school year
- Bring school into the community — "education food trucks"
- Drug awareness education for parents
- Develop more partnerships with local businesses

FROM OUR STAFF

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT DAY QUESTION:

- What additional training and professional development (PD) do the teachers here need to help address achievement gaps among student groups like multi-lingual learners, special education students and others?

ANSWERS INCLUDED:

- American Sign Language for staff, students and parents
- Spanish for staff
- Adverse childhood experiences training, restorative practices, trauma-informed practices, inclusive training for growing neurodivergent population
- Culturally responsive assessment tools to identify gaps
- Prekindergarten and kindergarten alignment
- Staffing: English language arts and math specialists at each building to provide job-embedded professional development; ML/ESOL staff in each building; specific staff for interventions; Special Education
- Give programs more time to grow (Stop one and done PD programs)
- Improve PD programs: cut down on lecture-style programs; align trainings across the district; more collaboration
- More planning and collaboration time

TAKEAWAYS:

There were lots of comments on curriculum and providing more supports for the full range of students, including multilingual learners and gifted and talented children. Additional discussions focused on teachers needing more time for collaboration, communication and training, and on giving programs and curriculums more time to grow.

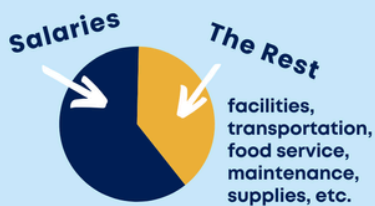

OUR ANNUAL BUDGET

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT DAY QUESTION:

ANSWERS INCLUDED:

- Hire cafeteria monitors (part-time, volunteers)
- Behavioral support teams in each building
- Improve building facades
- Improve building accessibility: ramps, elevators, wider doors
- Increase salaries and improve cost of living adjustments: start support staff at \$30,000; increase veteran teacher salaries since new teachers are starting at \$60,000
- Extending Jeenie translation app support to teachers
- Allow transportation and food service staff to service as substitutes in buildings to provide additional income opportunities
- Increase the course reimbursement rate
- Support staff for prekindergarten potty training
- Mental health days off for staff
- Another assistant principal at Kent County Middle School
- Return on investment for three elementary schools versus one on a single campus
- Review how Title funds are spent

TAKEAWAYS:

Much of the budgeting comments appeared to focus around increased staffing levels, especially support staff, and providing teachers more funding for supplies.

STAKEHOLDER SENTIMENTS

LEADING DISCUSSION TOPICS

- News sources: Families use more direct connections and social media; news organizations suffering from decreased readership among families; older residents are out of touch with schools
- Challenge negative narratives, highlight the positive, staff should not be spreading negativity to the public, engage community stakeholders to share positivity
- Providing evening events: parent nights so they can better help students with math and literacy work, community celebrations, visual and performing arts showcases, etc.
- Include incentives for family information nights like dinner, child care and door prizes
- Volunteers: create and share opportunities; volunteer coordinator; create a speakers bureau; expedited parent volunteer process; hold volunteer fairs
- One event calendar for all schools
- KCPS is communicating with families more than ever
- Build more community partnerships, especially with the library
- Find more ways to showcase students in public, participating in community (non-KCPS) events
- Become a sponsor of established and new local events
- Better coordination of events between schools

QUESTIONS TO ANSWER

- How do we coordinate and advertise volunteer opportunities?
- How do we build and expand partnerships with colleges, organizations and businesses?
- How do we better reach retiree population with news about our schools?
- How do we rebuild our PTAs?
- How do we build school spirit among students and parents?

NEW AND INTERESTING IDEAS

- Newcomer program providing consistent support
- Turn homecoming into a huge community event with a parade, spirit week at all schools, etc.
- Go big with a career day
- More community fundraisers — like a community yard sale, haunted house, kickball games, bonfires, family games
- Localize youth sports in each elementary school gym
- Hire a fundraiser
- We don't need more/new programs, we need problem-solvers
- Get elementary students to high school events to build up their excitement
- KCPS ad at the movie theater
- Food trucks at events
- Translators at school events
- Community dinners
- Adult programs including ESOL

FROM OUR STAFF

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT DAY QUESTION:

- What are some barriers to greater community engagement with our schools and how can we remove them?

ANSWERS INCLUDED:

- Not all families have online access: We need to make sure we can reach them with news
- Question-and-answer sessions with the community to share and explain our data
- Restart programs like Muffins for Moms to bring parents back into schools
- Set up ongoing donation and supply drives for families
- Learn about and be open to engaging with what is working in other districts
- Homework help for parents, like a homework hotline or video tutorials

TAKEAWAYS:

All stakeholders recognize the negative narratives around Kent County Public Schools. While communications have greatly improved, there were additional opportunities noted. Community volunteers was another leading topic, as well getting information out to those without students in the school system.

School-Based Support

KCPS has psychologists, social workers, school counselors and others to help students beyond daily instruction.

Teachers and staff also receive training to better recognize students' emotional and mental health needs to better ensure their success.

Something to think about ...

Social Emotional Learning is how we develop our own self and social awareness, interpersonal relationship skills and decision-making abilities.

Something to keep in mind ...

To be successful in school, a student needs to be in the mental and emotional space to learn.

School Safety

Each of our buildings has secured doors and security vestibules.

All staff members are trained in critical incident response and participate in regular safety drills.

Aligned goals in the Strategic Plan

- ★ We are committed to providing equitable access to high quality instruction and culturally responsive educational support programs

STAKEHOLDER SENTIMENTS

LEADING DISCUSSION TOPICS

- Community education on mental health and wraparound services
- Student discipline issues: bullying, fighting, restorative practices and "justice," students should be showing teachers respect
- Consistent training for staff
- More nutritious school meals with larger portions for older students
- Ensure reporting forms are digitized and easy to access
- Maintaining and adding mentoring programs
- Building more student engagement with leadership programs at the middle and high schools
- Good partnership with Choptank Community Health System
- Smaller class sizes
- No cell phones, including on school buses
- More training to help neurodivergent students
- Peer mentoring
- Extracurricular programming for all students

QUESTIONS TO ANSWER

- School safety: hardening buildings versus raising awareness and education
- Can we move Challenge Day to the beginning of the year and build out the follow-up programming?
- Can we offer more after-school support by having counselors and administrators training coaches and club leaders?

NEW AND INTERESTING IDEAS

- Create a more robust portal on our website for services
- Create a flowchart for points of contact
- Free driver's education scholarships
- Teachers having phones in classrooms
- Uniforms
- Portable metal detectors at the middle and high schools
- Therapy animal availability
- Male/female social workers and school counselors — allowing students to choose who they are most comfortable working with
- Mental health days for students and staff: one per quarter
- Coordinator for student supports
- Resource officers in all schools
- Updated doors that allow remote lockdown of areas
- More cohesive countywide collaboration with all buildings regarding important weeks, such as bullying prevention, suicide, mental health/health spirit weeks
- Clear backpacks for school safety

FROM OUR STAFF

SUPPORTING STUDENT SUCCESS

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT DAY QUESTION:

- What ideas or programs would you suggest to enhance safety, inclusion and positive mental health practices in our school?

ANSWERS INCLUDED:

- Additional adult support in classrooms
- No-touch teacher days: one per quarter
- Retain staff mental health clinician
- Needs-based student hours: More time for one-on-one support for those students that need it
- More ability-based student groupings
- In an effort to create inclusive opportunities we sometimes create unsafe environments for everyone
- Mental health curriculum including yoga, mindfulness
- Allow 12-month staff to work from home on PD days to help with stress
- Better documentation tracking for student behavior issues across grades and schools
- Add a School Security Officer
- Establish Peace Teams
- Grade level pods (printers, lounge area, pull groups per grade level)
- Bus aides on all buses
- More opportunities for socialization: Primary grades need more time for socialization skills

TAKEAWAYS:

Ensuring students have available wraparound services and a safe learning environment were key topics. Staff commented on the need for increased communication between grade levels and schools for tracking students and additional support for staff.

Built 1949; targeted renovations in '10s

Kent County High School

Built 1972, major renovations in the '00s and roof replaced in '20s

Worton Operations Center

Built 1969, closed as a school in 2017

Central Office

Built 1975, school closed and renovated for administrative offices in '00s

We are at the end of our Six-Year Strategic Facilities Plan.

What could the future of our seven buildings look like?

Kent County Middle School

Plans to replace Kent County Middle School at its current campus continue to move forward. We are currently reviewing prospective architecture firms for design.

Did you know ...

We are raising money to renovate the planetarium at Kent County High School? While still functional, the equipment is very old, with manual dials and switches for controls and cassette tapes and slides for media.

The planetarium has so much potential, not just for our students, but also the broader community.

LEADING DISCUSSION TOPICS

- Worton building uses
- New middle school
- Fifth grade at the middle school
- Age, appearance and functionality: room audit, HVAC upgrades, energy efficiency review
- Buildings are a selling point for KCPS: We are frequently compared to Queen Anne's and Cecil counties and Middletown, Del.
- Identify a task list for building improvements
- Strategizing inclusivity: playgrounds, bathrooms, access to second floors, bleachers
- Security: fencing, door knobs
- Buildings are clean
- Age-appropriate furniture at all levels, for students and staff, including standing desks for staff
- Central Office location
- Buildings are clean
- Address classrooms without windows/natural light
- Improving building facades and lobby areas to make more inviting: opportunity for garden clubs, etc.
- Science classrooms are outdated: potential targeted renovation for KCHS
- Install turf athletic fields

QUESTIONS TO ANSWER

- What should the future of the planetarium be? Are there better uses for the space or additional uses for the planetarium equipment beyond astronomy?
- Can we engage clubs to perform small upgrades on the buildings?

NEW AND INTERESTING IDEAS

- Sensory sensitivity: lighting and sound dampening, sensory stimulation rooms, calming rooms for elementary schools
- Onboarding locations for ML students
- Consolidate all facilities, sell properties and use funds for other strategic purposes
- Crossing guards at main intersections near GALES and KCMS

ANSWERS INCLUDED:

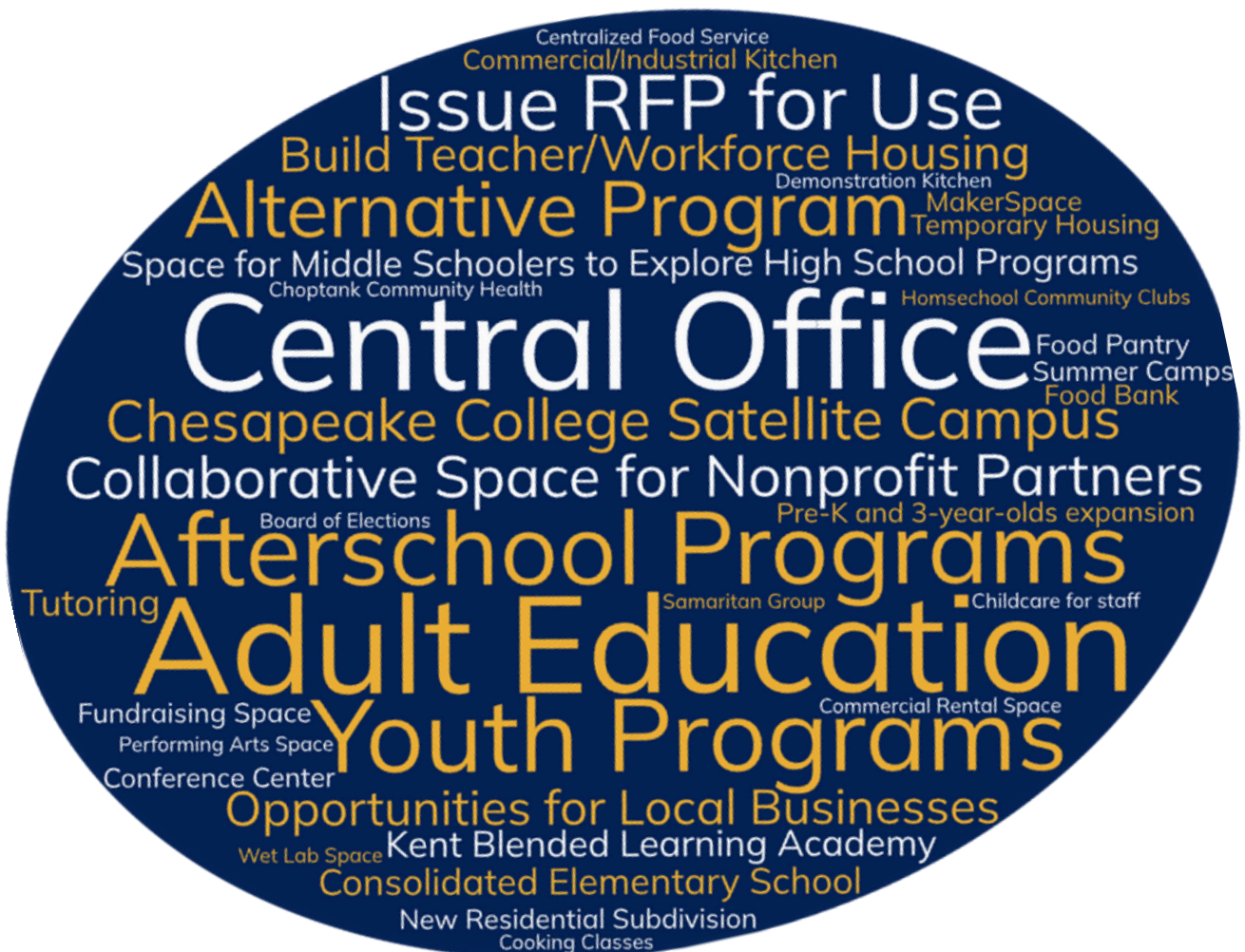
- Resource rooms for small groups

- Look at the uses of existing outdoor spaces at all buildings
- Remove asbestos tiles
- More bottle fill stations
- Improve HVAC controls in all buildings
- Classroom furniture — no more desks attached to chairs

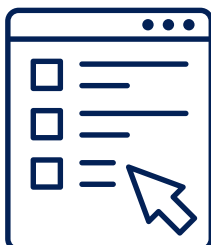
